Fruits of Love

- I. <u>Introduction</u>
 - A. Loving our neighbors as ourselves is the foundation of treating others as God desires. Consider some fruits of genuine love for others. Matthew 22:37-40
- II. Love is Longsuffering
 - A. If we love as we should, we will not be short-tempered with others or retaliate when treated poorly. Instead, we will be patient toward all. **1 Corinthians 13:4**; **1 Thess. 5:14-15**
- III. Love Forgives Others
 - A. If we love others as we should, we will not keep a mental list of their mistakes to use it against them. Love does not harbor bitter grudges or resentment, but is forgiving.
 1 Corinthians 13:5; Colossians 3:13
- IV. Love Desires Others' Good
 - A. If we love others as ourselves, we will desire the best *in* them and *for* them. **1 Corinthians 13:7**
- V. Love Seeks Others' Good
 - A. Moreover, genuine love for others will lead us to *seek* the best for others. Instead of only asking what pleases self, love considers others' needs. **1 Corinthians 13:5**; **10:23-24**
- VI. Love Yields Benevolence
 - A. Love for others is proven through benevolent acts. 1 John 3:17
- VII. Love Shows Kindness
 - A. More generally, love treats others kindly and compassionately, both in deeds and in speech. **1 Corinthians 13:4**; **Eph. 4:31-32**

VIII. Love is Not Contentious

- A. While love yields positive virtues such as kindness, patience, and forgiveness, love opposes contentious, quarrelsome attitudes. Galatians 5:14-15
- IX. Love Discourages Sin
 - A. This is not to say that love tolerates evil. Genuine love discourages sin out of sincere concern for others' souls.
 1 Corinthians 13:6; Mark 10:21-22
- X. Love Judges Righteously
 - A. Love for others is also the root of avoiding the sin of partiality. **James 2:8-9**
 - B. This sin which the Holy Spirit through James condemns is a form of unrighteous judgment. *Righteous* judgment is in many ways a product of love. John 7:24
- XI. Love Shuns Gossip
 - A. Love is also the root of overcoming sinful gossip. When the "golden rule" is followed, gossip is rejected.
 1 Corinthians 13:7; Proverbs 17:9
- XII. Love Opposes Envy
 - A. Moreover, love rejects the sin of envy. While envy shows discontentment at others' good fortune (especially if such fortune is desired for oneself), love opposes such an attitude. **1 Corinthians 13:4**; Matthew 27:18
- XIII. Love Avoids Self-exaltation
 - A. Genuine love does not seek to exalt self above others. The pride and boastfulness of seeking preeminence is overcome through love. 1 Corinthians 13:4; Matthew 23:5-7
