Are There Mechanical Instruments In Heaven?

One attempt to justify the use of mechanical instruments in our worship comes from Revelation 14:2, which states, "And I heard a voice from heaven, like the sound of many waters and like the sound of loud thunder, and the voice which I heard was like the sound of harpists playing on their harps."

The argument made by liberal folks goes something like, "See, there are mechanical instruments in Heaven --- the harps. Therefore, God condones them, and we need to use them today." But is this true? Well, there are four reasons why this argument fails.

First, notice the first part of the verse, "And I heard a voice from heaven." From where did John hear the voice? From earth? No, from Heaven! Nowhere do we read about anyone on earth ever using a mechanical instrument in worship in the New Testament. Here is the list of all references in the New Testament to singing on earth (Matt. 26:30, Mk. 14:26, Acts 16:25, Rom. 15:9, 1 Cor. 14:15, Eph. 5:19, Col. 3:16, Heb. 2:12, Heb. 13:15, Jas. 5:13). For the sake of space, I can't print these passages, but I highly encourage you to read them. You will find no reference to mechanical instruments whatsoever.

Second, notice the words concerning the harps, "and the voice which I heard was like the sound of harpists playing on their harps." Notice that John did not hear harps playing but a voice that was like the sound of harps. Therefore, there's not even a reference here to the use of mechanical instruments in Heaven. John was comparing the voice he heard to the lovely sound of a harp in this passage.

Third, notice the context. Verse 3 says, "And they sang a new song before the throne and before the four living creatures and the elders; and no one could learn the song except the one hundred and forty-four thousand who had been purchased from the earth." Notice, not only does it say that the 144,000 were the only ones who could learn this specific song (the 144,000 were symbolic of those saved in the twelve tribes of Israel according to Revelation 7:4-8), but also that they sang. They didn't play anything. Even if one were to successfully argue that these passages proved there are mechanical instruments in Heaven --- which they won't --- there is no proof that man was the one playing the instruments.

Finally, one needs to understand that the book of Revelation is symbolic. It states so in the very first verse of the book. The KJV reads, "The Revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave unto Him, to shew unto his servants things which must shortly come to pass; and He signified it by His angel unto His servant John" (Rev. 1:1). Notice the word signified. It literally means "symbolic." When reading the book of Revelation, one needs to remember two main things. (1) It consists of things which must shortly come to pass, and (2) it was signified or symbolic.

God commands us to sing unto Him with only one instrument, the heart. Ephesians 5:19 states, "Speaking to one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody with your heart to the Lord." The phrase "making melody" comes from the

Greek "psalto" which literally means "to pluck or strike the cords on a musical instrument." To psalto with the heart is what it says. Instead of using the mechanical instruments man wants us to sing with, let's use the one instrument God commands us to use to worship Him, the heart.

Something's Not Right
